Zoom Meetings: Etiquette and Best Practices

Think of a Zoom Meeting as a face-to-face meeting and conduct yourself as you would if you were all present in the same room. Here are some useful tips to observe to help ensure the meeting goes smoothly for all involved:

- Log in with your name or identify yourself so you can be renamed by the host.
- Log in early for social time when all can chat and socialize.
 - Please remember that we should be courteous and allow one person to speak so they can be heard.
- All participants WILL be muted at the start of the business meeting. Please keep yourself muted while we are conducting the meeting!
- For a better zoom experience please:
 - Limit distractions to focus on the meeting by turning off notifications. closing or minimizing running apps, and muting your smartphone or home phone.
 - Have your laptop, iPad or smartphone plugged in to the power. source as running zoom uses a lot of power.
 - Position your camera properly and be sure it is in a stable position and at eye level so you can be seen.
- Be mindful of background noise and activities. Remember we can see what is going on in the foreground and background of your camera!

To help keep background noise to a minimum, make sure you mute your microphone when you are not speaking.

When your microphone is not muted, avoid activities that could create additional noise, such as shuffling papers or having other conversations.

If you must take a call or carry on a conversation outside of the meeting, please mute YOURSELF!

Zoom uses a lot of bandwidth so there may be a lag in time or things may appear jumpy during the presentation.

We apologize in advance if the internet connection is lost during the meeting

September Block of the Month


North Cities Quilt Guild September BOM - 202020




Color 1 (fall colors floral) 1-5" x 15" strip into twelve 2-1/2" squares.


1- 5" x 9" strip into four 2-1/2" x 4-1/2" rectangles. 1- 2 7/8" x 11 1/2" strip.





Color 2 (complement or light color)
1- 5" x 15" strip into twelve 2-1/2" squares.
1- 5" x 9" strip into four 2-1/2" x 4-1/2" rectangles
1- 4 1/2" square






Speed piece the half squares: stack Color 1 and Color 2 2-7/8" x 11-1/2" strips, right sides together and all edges aligned. On the back of the top strip, lightly mark the 2-7/8" square lines and then mark the diagonals as shown at left. Sew 1/4" above and below the marked diagonals, pivoting at the square lines. Cut apart on the marked diagonals, and cut

on the square lines. Press seam allowances towards the darker fabric. Should measure 2-1/2"


1-2 7/8" x 11 1/2" strip.



Make the flying geese units, place Color 1 small square right sides together atop a Color 2 rectangle, with edges aligned. Lightly mark the diagonal on top square. Sew ON this line. Cut off the excess seam allowance. Press the remainder towards the triangle. Make 4.

Make four more geese units using Color 1 rectangles and

Color 2 squares. Trim these to measure 2-1/2" x 4-1/2"



Lay out all sewn units and squares as shown at left. Sew five horizontal rows, using the same scant 1/4" seams. Press seams in alternating directions by row. Sew the rows together

again at last Road. Made on grids






This was a block of the month. Precut and very heavy wall hanging.




